## **PRESIDENT'S REPORT**

---

The board of DBSA continues its focus on our Strategic Plan. Each aspect of the plan is reviewed at our monthly board meetings. One of the six Core Business Areas is reviewed each time to ensure we are meeting our targets and maintaining our commitments to our members. As per our program agreement with the Office of Recreation and Sport I will report against our Strategic plan as follows.

### **ADMINISTRATION**

- 1.1 The position of Business Services Officer is yet to be filled however some strong candidates have emerged and interviews will be conducted soon.
- 1.2 The AGM saw Peter Button (Powerblades) join the board and Jeremy Sanders (ACDC) accepted a board invitation to join. All brought a wealth of business and sporting knowledge and have proved invaluable in making this a successful season.
- 1.3 The Office of Recreation and Sport provided the services of a facilitator to help conduct a review of our Strategic Plan which is due to be updated for the next three years. A very successful day was spent with members of clubs to help shape the future of our sport. The results are being collated and a new plan will be presented soon.
- 1.4 Sharon Knights resigned from the board at the conclusion of the racing season and a letter of appreciation for her service was sent.
- 1.5 The board continued to review and where needed update all of its policies. It was decided that where AusDBF follows the policies and procedures of IDBF then we would follow suit. This aligns us nationally and internationally and also allowed us to reduce the number of policies where interests are already covered by the policies of the National body.
- 1.6 We have now seen some significant changes to the sport in South Australia. The minimum age limit of paddlers has been dropped from 12yrs old to 10yrs old. The minimum age for Drummers and Sweeps remains 12yrs old. The Age Eligibility was changed to be 31<sup>st</sup> December in any given year as per AusDBF.
- 1.7 In consultation with the club Presidents and Race Committee it was decided to trial different race categories for the 2018/19 season. All regattas will now consist of three categories, Open Age, Seniors (40+ yrs of age) and over 55's. The State Championships were run over the traditional categories of Open, Senior A, Senior B and Senior C.
- 1.8 At the conclusion of the season the race committee met and decided to return to the traditional categories for the coming season. Open age, Senior A (40+ years of age), Senior B (50+ years of age) and Senior C (60+ years of age).

### **PROMOTION AND MARKETING**

- 2.1 Our website is constantly reviewed to ensure that content remains current and relevant. With Sharon Knights, Tanya Mitchell, Chris Wood and Marie Cunningham we are enhancing our use of social media to promote the sport.
- 2.2 While regular media coverage is always a challenge we continue to be supported by regional print.  
Due to the relentless recruiting efforts of several clubs we have had some good publicity.
- 2.3 After research undertaken by Chris Wood the board approved the purchase of an electronic signboard to be used in the boatshed at Aquatic reserve to be used to provide information to members.
- 2.4 The Junior State Team (Dragonmites) continues to grow and be popular with our younger paddlers.
- 2.5 We continue to have a banner on Port Rd to aid in the promotion of Dragonboating.

## **COACHING AND OFFICIATING**

- 3.1 DBSA continues its commitment to providing the opportunity for members to build on their skills. As with previous seasons we offer courses in Level 1 coaching as well as training and accreditation in Sweeping.
- 3.2 A Senior First aid course was run and we will continue to offer this each year as the need arises. It is planned to record accreditations on Revolutionise to ensure Sweeps and coaches remain up to date.
- 3.3 A database will now be kept by AusDBF so that qualifications will be recognised by all member states.

## **PARTICIPATION**

- 4.1 Mawson Lakes is the only body of water in the Northern suburbs suitable for Dragon boating and hopes were raised after an approach from Jerry Elder from the local rowing club. This has not progressed as yet but we remain hopeful that an event may be held there in the future.
- 4.2 The Masters Games were successfully held in Port Pirie with all crews reporting favourably on the event. Some improvements are needed in the registration process and that will once again be addressed with the organising committee. The 2019 Australian Masters Games will be held in Adelaide at Aquatic reserve and DBSA will be encouraging participation.
- 4.3 A well-supported Hat Regatta was held in Port Lincoln, which was followed up by a coaching session, by Aurora Vi Duong.
- 4.4 It was sad to see the annual Corporate Challenge cancelled this year due to lack of entries. Work is being done by Maryanne Holt who has managed to garner some new interest in the event.
- 4.5 It was decided by the board to provide an allowance to volunteers who assist with corporate events.
- 4.6 Tanya Mitchell and Chris Wood were spearheading a sub committee to organise an Amazing Race event at Goolwa this year. Unfortunately the timetable did not allow enough time so this has been put on hold for now.
- 4.7 A Scout Jamboree was held at Tailem Bend in 2019 and it attracted 8000 participants. John Holland continued to liaise with the organisation. Scout leaders were trained as sweeps and were joined by several sweeps from DBSA clubs. This was very successful and introduced our sport to a new audience.
- 4.8 Club of the Year nominations were sought and DBSA is waiting for the end of season dinner to congratulate the Metro Club of the Year- and the Regional Club of the Year.

## **VOLUNTEERS**

- 5.1 Sourcing volunteers remains a major issue and all clubs have been reminded that they need to provide a volunteer on race days.
- 5.2 Our annual volunteers' lunch is still being organised with DBSA looking at a different kind of event this year. It's a great chance to say thank you to all those who helped out during the past season and we look forward to seeing the invitee's.
- 5.3 Sharon Knights was our Volunteer coordinator and maintained the logbooks. The board would like to thank Sharon for her work.

## **HIGH PERFORMANCE**

- 6.1 The State Team performed well at the National Championships mainly due to the hard work of State Opens and Senior A Coach Vi Duong and Seniors Coach Julie Lister. While there is still some work to be done the team performed above expectations.
- 6.2 The High Performance committee will be sending out EOI shortly for aspiring state coaches to take up the challenge of developing our talent in the pursuit of medals in Penrith 2020.
- 6.3 Nominations were called for a flag bearer to represent SA at the Nationals in Canberra 2019. This honour went to Vi Duong after years of service at the highest level.

## **CONCLUSION**

There have many challenges during my Two years as DBSA President and I would expect no less. The support given by my fellow board members, Chris Wood, Tanya Mitchell, Jennifer Bould, Sharon Knights, Vi Duong, Maria Darby, Peter Button and Jeremy Sanders have allowed us to overcome obstacles while striving for an exciting future. My heartfelt thanks go to all of them as well as John Holland who has a passion for the sport, which is unmatched.

My greatest challenge and joy has been the arrival of my daughter Amelie. The way the dragonboat community has embraced her has been nothing short of amazing. She now has more Aunties, Uncles and grandparents than anyone could wish for and she loves you all. While Leonie and I are extremely grateful for all the support it is now time for me to step down from the board and spend more time with them both.

Based on the feedback from the Office of Recreation and Sport Governance Review our board functions extremely well and I look forward to seeing this continue on as the sport of Dragonboating moves forward.

The addition to invited guests, Ms Leah Cassidy's partner and boys provided an added component to the ceremony, with the boys enjoying the opportunity to dot an eye. It was a welcome sight having family of an invited guest participate in the ceremony, as to me, it reflects the community mindedness of this annual event. Yes, it is an opening ceremony to the racing season for DBSA, but more than that, the participation of other water users consolidates dragon boating as an active member of those sharing West Lakes waters for recreation and competitive sporting bodies.

Positive comments are always received regarding the involvement of the Buddhist community and various guests from organisations using West Lakes, with no exception for the past season's ceremony. ## **JUNIOR DEVELOPMENT REPORT**

---

This season was a groundbreaking one for juniors in South Australia. We decided early to put a Dragonmite crew together for AusChamps in Canberra and four of our juniors decided to try out for the Auroras.

The four juniors were invited to the selection camp and Cassidy Burns, Finn Coleman and Jackson Petkovic were all successful and they set about preparing themselves to be the best they can be for the World Championships in Thailand this coming August. They are training with the older South Australian Auroras and are a definite asset to the team.

DBSA has had a junior crew at AusChamps in the past but it has only been when the championships have been held on home water at West Lakes. This year was the first time that we have taken a junior crew to AusChamps interstate and it was a great success and even though we didn't come home with medals the crew really worked hard and they put up a great performance in Open 10, with 5 boys and 5 girls. They will certainly benefit from the experience and have come home eager to improve and be even more competitive in Penrith next year.

We currently have fifteen paddlers participating and recruitment continues to be a major focus for the group – we have had a number of new paddlers join us this year but we did lose five who had been with us for a couple of years. I am aware that there are juniors in some clubs who have not given the Dragonmites a try – it is a great group who are all very supportive and they make sure that paddling is fun.

A number of DBSA Juniors also participated in the Joeys crews at AusChamps on Club Crew days and the experience really enthused them and has seen them come back with a greater respect for the sport.

Throughout the year we had the following junior activities:

### **City of Charles Sturt School Holiday Programs**

The CCS again facilitated sessions with registered sports clubs for juniors during school holidays and we had 2 sessions in October 2018 and 2 sessions in April 2019 with total registrations of 147 participants. I wish to thank the sweeps and paddlers who came out to assist with these programs – although we do not gain many members through it initially, it introduces youngsters to our sport and may provide the impetus for them to join in the future.

### **Western Zone School Day**

This has become a regular fixture on our calendar – we have about 6 schools from the Western Zone participate in a Dragon Boat day which incorporates a training session followed by some racing. We have around 150 youngsters participate and it is mainly directed at introducing the children to Dragon Boating. Again it is fantastic to have the support of sweeps and paddlers from all clubs to make this a really successful day

### **Portside Christian School**

This local school is taking advantage of their proximity and are including dragon boating on their calendar – around 14 students participated in 2018 and they will be joining the Western Zone day in 2019 and will have several training sessions before the big day

### **Mount Carmel College**

Mt Carmel College continues to include Dragon Boating in their PE curriculum for 4 weeks during October and November. There were 2 classes per week and we worked through a program of introduction through to racing and it gave the participants a great introduction to the sport and may help to stimulate future involvement.

All of these programs would not be possible without the help of our enthusiastic volunteers – my heartfelt thanks to all for your contribution to the growth of our sport.

The inclusion of juniors in a club can prove very rewarding – some seem to shy away from it for various reasons but from personal experience I can confirm that the benefits far outweigh any perceived problems. Family groups can participate together and the juniors can certainly bring in some fresh perspectives to the group and they certainly bring value to the crew.

I can only encourage other clubs to embrace the junior concept and I am happy to assist wherever required.

## **SWEEPS COMMITTEE REPORT**

---

The DBSA Sweep Committee (SC) is a committee established and appointed by the Board of DragonBoat SA to provide specialist assistance and advice in training, assessing and maintaining consistent standards across all sweeps who are affiliated with members of DBSA.

They are tasked with the following objectives

- Organise and run Sweep Training Courses
- Assess sweeps for progression through sweep levels
- Provide updates for the Sweep Register on the DBSA website
- Assess sweep re-accreditations
- Recommend updates for the Sweep Training course
- Communicate with DBSA sweeps to maintain safety and consistency
- Set an annual Training Course timetable
- Review policies and procedures which affect sweeps and make recommendations to the DBSA board
- Set an annual meeting schedule (minimum 4 meetings per year)
- Other duties as allocated

The current DBSA sweeps committee comprises Veronica Lane (Chairperson), John Holland, Steve Clinch, Chris Kelley (DBSA & AUSDBF Sweeps committee), Jan Bice and Dave Gillies. The focus early in the year has been providing input via the AUSDBF sweeps committee to assist in creating an Auswide sweeps manual and accreditation scheme. This has had a successful outcome and is now being rolled out to all states.

We have continued to assess sweeps once they are deemed to have completed the requirements to attain the next level.

I am currently working with Revsport to allow clubs to view and monitor the level and currency of their sweeps. This includes updated first aid certificates which are required for certification.

During the off season we are busy planning the next round of sweeps courses and ensuring these dates are updated on the DBSA website.

Further discussion continues on how we can lift the standard of sweeping in SA by providing ongoing support and training.

We are all looking forward to another successful season on and off the water.

## **HIGH PERFORMANCE PORTFOLIO FOR 2019 DBSA AGM**

---

Every year there seems to be a variety of challenges to overcome when putting together the SA State Team as we experienced in 2018 when a late change in venue resulted in only 46 people competing in the Qld Nationals State v State competition. However, 2019 seemed to come together quite effortlessly from an organisational point of view.

Although Canberra is one of the more expensive States to travel to, 7 SA Clubs made the journey to compete at the Australian Dragon Boat Championships. Club attendances of this volume certainly goes a long way in putting together more competitive State crews.

Julie Lister, Vi Duong and John Holland were appointed as Coaches for Senior B & C, Premier & Senior A and Juniors respectively. Pre-Christmas saw everyone training together in mixed crews which is very effective in bringing people together and enables good interaction and building of camaraderie early into the campaign.

Below you will read reports from each of the State Coaches together with a brief summation of what has been transpiring in the lives of our SA Auroras over the last 8-12 months. The Junior Development Report is located elsewhere within the DBSA Annual Report.

### **AURORA'S 2019 THAILAND CAMPAIGN** *prepared by Bryan Buttery*

The Aurora's 2019 Thailand campaign began last July for the Juniors and in August for the rest.

This was when we did our State-based fitness testing in order to secure an invitation to attend the national selection camps. The selection camps were tough, fitness test benchmarks were completed in front of all applicants. Paddlers were paired up and raced off against each other in 2 races for their spots. Times and techniques were scrutinised, and if you were good enough, you made selection.

This year, the National Coach took much smaller teams with many divisions only taking squads for 10's boat racing. This made the competition for spots even tougher as there were only 12 spots available within several divisions.

The competition being in Thailand has gleaned a lot of interest. For example, the Senior B women had over 70 applicants in the initial phase. Those who were selected certainly deserved their spots.

South Australia had 13 successful applicants. Pleasingly, whilst the senior divisions have traditionally been well supported in previous campaigns, in this campaign we also have Under 16's and 18's and a Premier paddler selected. In fact, South Australian's are represented in every division apart from the Under 24's.

This is a first for us, and hopefully something to build on. Our national State vs State results indicate that we do have some excellent paddlers in South Australia.

Finally, after about a year long journey, many sacrifices, 3 gym sessions a week, runs, paddle ergs, 4 sessions a week in dragon boats and single crafts, we are on the cusp of going to Thailand. Again, being Thailand, this year's Worlds Nations Championships has received lots of interest and we're racing countries who I've not seen in my previous campaigns. 28 countries will be competing. It should be very exciting.

Special mention and thanks to Darryl Bockmann who has swept every training session. Without his commitment, our paddlers would not have been able to train together.

**AURORA'S 2019 THAILAND CAMPAIGN** *prepared by Vi Duong*

This season there was a record number of SA paddlers selected into the Australian Dragon Boat Team. A total of 13 paddlers (including 2 standby) were selected. Also for the first time in SA, 4 Junior paddlers (1 Standby) can call themselves Auroras.

Their journey started 12 months ago at the State based fitness test where a record number of paddlers, sweeps and drummers (25) participated. Twenty two of the 25 participants that tried out received invitations to Auroras selection camp.

## SOUTH AUSTRALIA'S 2019 STATE SQUAD



### **PREMIER/SENIOR A STATE TEAMS** *prepared by Coach, Vi Dong*

In recent years participation from Premier (and Senior A) paddlers at the National has declined.

The goal for the 2018/2019 season was to encourage new paddlers to be a part of the State Team. It's a good opportunity for paddlers to further develop their skills and experience competition at a higher level.

We set-out to recruit enough paddlers to fill Premier 20 Open and Women 20 crews, supported by Senior A, B and C paddlers.

The combined squad was 49 paddlers, 3 drummers and 3 sweeps. Most clubs were well represented. 18 Water Warriors, 10 Subsonix, 8 Black Dragons, 7 Powerblades, 5 ACDC, 3 Sea Dragons, 2 Victor Dragons and 2 Bladerunners.

It was good to see we had 19 paddlers relatively new to dragon boating in the squad.

The results at Nationals are as follows:

Results are not unexpected. There is a wide gap between experienced and novice paddlers. Interstate teams were well represented and had a strict selection criterion.

In conclusion, we achieved the goals we set ourselves. Paddlers were able to experience a higher level of competition. They can now understand the standard required in order to compete at that level. This may encourage individuals to further develop and improve within their Club. They may also strive towards trying out for the Australian 'Auroras'.

### **SENIOR B/SENIOR C** prepared by Coach, Julie Lister

The 2019 State Team campaign is now concluded after finishing with a nail-biting end and that millisecond win over NSW for gold.

### **Training**

Training until the end of December was undertaken as a State Team with all age groups paddling together in mixed boats. Once the Coaches had determined their team selection, training was segregated to Juniors, Premiers & Senior A and Senior B & C with each Coach determining their own training schedules.

Overall a total number of 138 paddlers attended one or more training session and after selection 116 paddlers represented South Australia from 11 different clubs. As in previous years attracting Premiers and Senior A age groups proved a challenge with various age groups coming together to fill the standard boats. The Senior B and C's welcomed new paddlers trying out for the first time and all were challenged with a selection process that included single paddling time trials.

We really put on a show for local residents and tourists with up to 5 boats out on the water together and we'll feature in many photographs and videos.

My thanks go to the stand in sweeps who, at short notice assisted me at training allowing options for numerous boats to be out on the water each session: Steve Holt (ASA) and Tina Pupello (Warriors). Without their help my sessions would have been shall we say 'up the creek without a paddle' or maybe 'on the lake without a sweep'.

From the sessions held between 12/1/19 and 7/4/19 average attendance varied:

- Premiers and Senior A – between 33% and 87% each session
- Senior B and C – between 68% and 93% each session

### **Merchandise / State Top**

A new State Team top was designed and was met with favourable feedback retaining the old bold colours of red, blue and yellow and the iconic SA yellow dragon. Due to the merchandiser making an error in the first order (at their cost) we have a number of tops, mainly ladies singlets available for sale for future years.

### **State v State Championships**

Whilst all teams paddled hard, results were mixed with only the Senior B and C winning medals. For the Senior B and C boats the teams in the heats differed from the final with the strongest team out on the water whilst ensuring everyone selected had at least two paddling opportunities. From 6 categories we won 4 bronze, came a very close 4<sup>th</sup> and won a gold in the Senior B Men's small boat.
