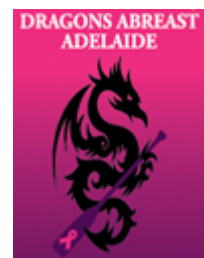

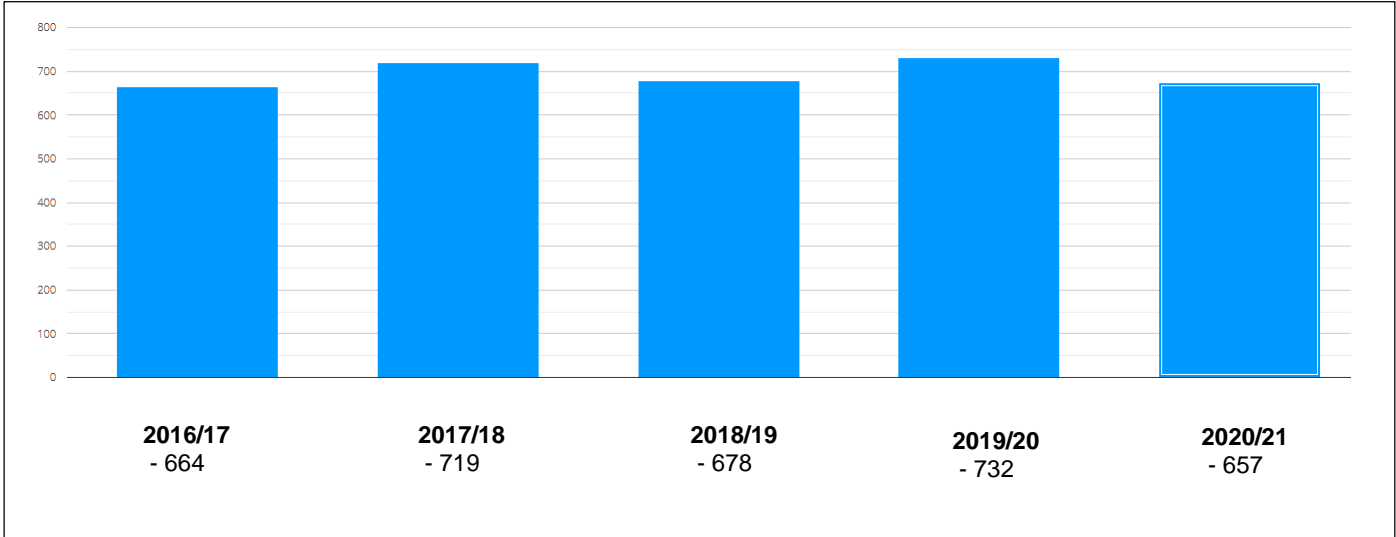

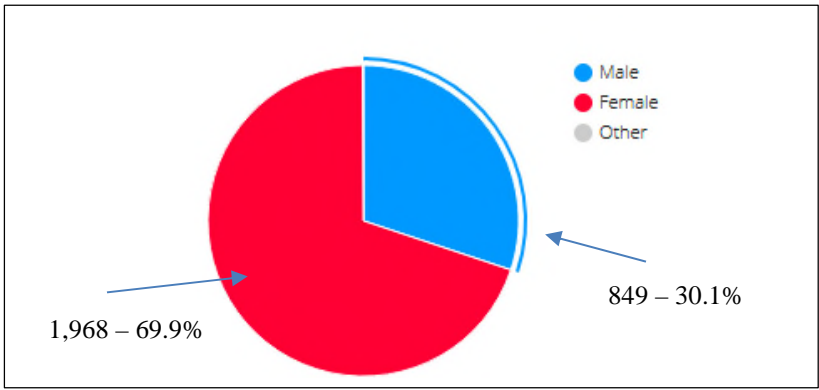
Members per Season

PRESIDENT'S REPORT

The Dragon Boating season saw us return to the water after the pandemic restrictions were lifted in late June 2020. Credit to all Member Clubs cooperating diligently with the tracking/tracing, social distancing, hygiene and COVID Officer/Marshal training requirements.

The racing season began well with minimal disruptions to scheduled events. The only interruption to the season came about after the COVID outbreak in November 2020, however the Racing Committee reviewed the Racing calendar, and we were able to reschedule the Peter Bristow long Course Race to January 2021.

The Board of DBSA continued its focus on finalising our Strategic Plan, the Plan for 2020/25 was promulgated in December 2020. Each aspect of the plan is reviewed at our monthly Board meetings. One of the six Core Business Areas is reviewed each time to ensure we are meeting our targets and maintaining our commitments to our members.

Several Members of the Board have engaged with the local Council and other stakeholders to seek Federal funding to design and redevelop the facilities at Aquatic Reserve.

Significant highlights for 2020 – 2021:

- Promulgation of the 2020/25 Strategic Plan
- Preparation for the 2022 AusChamps in Adelaide
- Successful negotiations and allocation of Federal funding to rebuild the shared facilities at Aquatic Reserve
- Review of the fee structure to ensure fair and equitable ratio to regional and remote clubs
- Partnership established with Merlin Paddles

ADMINISTRATION

- The 2020/21 AGM saw Valda Cooper (Copper Coast Battle Dragons), Julie Clinch (Blade Runners) and Kat Reid (BSD), join the Board. All brought a wealth of business and sporting knowledge and have proved invaluable with the management of our association.



- The position of Business Services Officer is yet to be filled; however, the functions of the position are being reviewed in line with the business requirements of DBSA.
- In addition to the monthly Board meetings the DBSA Board has been conducting regular Governance meetings to review the strategic documents and processes of the association. It was decided that where AusDBF follows the policies and procedures of IDBF, then DBSA would follow suit and AusDBF policies and procedures when they suit DBSA's business needs. This aligns us nationally and internationally and also allowed us to reduce the number of policies where interests are already covered by the policies of the National body.
- Adelaide and DBSA will be hosting the 2022 AusChamps at the A.M. Ramsay Regatta Course, with monthly meeting underway to ensure the 2022 AusChamps are as successful as possible.
- At the conclusion of the 20/21 season the Racing Committee met to draft the Racing Calendar for the 21/22 Season. The racing categories were also discussed at this meeting. The Racing Committee supported the traditional categories for the 20/21 season. Open age, Senior A (40+ years of age), Senior B (50+ years of age) and Senior C (60+ years of age).

PROMOTION AND MARKETING


- Our website is constantly reviewed to ensure that content remains current and relevant. DBSA is enhancing the use of social media with regular updates from Racing Meetings posted to promote the sport of dragon boating.
- While regular media coverage is always a challenge we continue to be supported by regional print and publicity from the Corporate Cup Challenge through the Women's and Children's Health Network online newsletter.
- The program for the electronic sign board to be used in the boatshed at Aquatic reserve has been upgraded and is available to convey important messages to members.
- The Junior State Team (Dragonmites) remains popular with our younger paddlers. The Dragonmites brochure has been redesigned and distributed.

COACHING AND OFFICIATING

- DBSA continues its commitment to provide the opportunity for members to build on their skills. As with previous seasons we offer courses in Level 1 coaching as well as training and accreditation in Sweeping.
- Senior First aid courses are run each year as the need arises. Accreditations are recorded in Revolutionise Sport to ensure Sweeps and Coaches remain up to date.
- A database is kept by AusDBF to ensure qualifications are recognised by all member states.



PARTICIPATION

- The Regional Masters Games were successfully held in April 2021 at Kadina with the DragonBoat event held in the Wallaroo Marina with over 280 participants. The Board received positive feedback from all participating crews. A letter of thanks/congratulations was sent to the organising committee:
 Valda Cooper, Vi Duong and John Holland



- A well-supported Hat Regatta was held at Goolwa facilitated by ACDC Goolwa River Dragons.



- The annual Corporate Challenge was held this year during the race day on 31 January 2020, coordinated by Vi Duong. This event was attended and enjoyed by four (4) Corporate Teams (EFM Port Adelaide A & B, Access 4 U and Olympic Sports).

- Vogalonga Down Unda event at Goolwa in May 2021.
- The racing season culminated with the SA State Championships held on 27 and 28 March 2021 at A.M. Ramsay Regatta Course. This event ran smoothly, a big congratulation to the organisers and to the successful teams.



VOLUNTEERS

- The sport of Dragon boating and the success of our race days is made possible by the efforts of many people, in particular the volunteers. Without them the ability to facilitate the sport is not possible. On behalf of the Board, I would like to extend the thanks of the entire association for their support.
- Pat Doogue facilitated a training day for volunteers in February 2020, this was attended by many participants and well received.
- Our Volunteers thank you function was facilitated in conjunction with the annual awards dinner held at the Glenelg Golf Club on Saturday 29 May 2021.
- Julie Clinch took over the role of Volunteer Coordinator from Allison Bretones and the Board would like to thank her for this.
- Sourcing volunteers remains an issue and all Clubs have been reminded that they need to provide a volunteer on race days.



HIGH PERFORMANCE

- The State Team prepared well to compete at the Australian Championships mainly due to the hard work of Vi Duong and Julie Lister. Unfortunately, as previously reported, the Australian Championships were cancelled.
- The High Performance committee have sent out an EOI for coaches to take up the challenge of developing our talent in the pursuit of medals at the AusChamps in Adelaide, April 2022.

CONCLUSION

There have many challenges during this year as DBSA President. The support given by my fellow Board members, Jennifer Bould, Vi Duong, Maria Darby, Allison Bretones, Michael Cahill, Kat Reid, Valda Cooper and Julie Clinch have allowed us to overcome obstacles while striving to make the sport of dragon boating successful in South Australia.

My heartfelt thanks go to all of them as well as John Holland who has been our link to AusDBF.

I would also like to thank Marie Cunningham for her support to DBSA throughout the year, Marie's corporate knowledge of our sport has been a great assistance.

Based on the feedback from the Office of Recreation, Sport & Racing our Board functions extremely well and I look forward to seeing this continue on as the sport of dragon boating moves forward.

Register Creation The Board have created various consolidated digital registers including past and current volunteers, volunteer training records, keys issued to DBSA participants, Come and Try participants and trophies. These registers are live documents and maintained on the DBSA G drive.

Online booking for small craft An online resource booking platform has been launched. Using Picktime, smaller dragon boating craft may be booked by anyone in the Association. This has resulted in administrative time saving.

This was my first time ever sitting on a Board for an organisation and I wish to thank my fellow Board members for their support and for providing me with a fascinating insight into what happens behind the scenes of a sporting Association.

I have greatly enjoyed being a member of the South Australian dragon boating community for the last 5 years and thank all the wonderful people I have met for making this experience a great one!

RACING COMMITTEE REPORT

The Racing Committee met on 11 occasions throughout the year to plan the 2020/21 and once to plan the 2021/22 season.

Clubs continue, where possible, to have two delegates on this committee with meetings held either in person at The Sailing Club and online via Zoom depending on the COVID-19 restrictions at the time.

Of note during the year:

- COVID-19 Safe Plans were in place and updated as new plans issued:
 - Clubs were each assigned their own boat for exclusive use on Race Days and responsible for dressing (head, tail drum) and sanitising between races if sharing with another category.
 - Clubs required to maintain their own contact lists for contact tracing on Race Days.
 - Clubs requested to not swap life jackets where possible (sanitise in between).
 - Organising Club provided a COVID Marshall on race days.
 - COVID Marshall Kits were purchased for each Club.
 - Boats were spread out further when returning to the beach.
 - Paddlers marshalled near their own tent.
 - Only 18 paddlers were allowed in a 20s boat.
 - Boat and equipment cleaning processes put in place.



- Consideration was given to changing the race order so that Premier racing would be held first up to allow them to leave earlier as they have fewer race day. The Racing Committee agreed there would be no change to the race order for the 20/21 season.
- Composite teams continued to be formed and were considered 'not for points' on the respective race day.
- Barry Gowers (WOW FM) was appointed as Race commentator for one race only and then he resigned.
- Max Stevens appointed as Race Announcer for remainder of season.
- Clubs encouraged to purchase their own radios and have them with the until the end of the race day so they can hear, and calls made over them in case the PA was not working.
- Mobile Coffee Bean was again engaged to provide catering for the season.
- Wallaroo Marina Challenge event held on Saturday 7 November.
- AusChamps event scheduled in Perth in October 2021 was cancelled due to COVID-19.
- Peter Bristow event rescheduled to Saturday 16 January 2021 due to COVID-19.
- Vogalonga Down Unda event was rescheduled to 16 May 2021 due to COVID-19.
- Hat regatta held on Saturday 13 February 201 at Goolwa.
- Clubs reminded throughout the season to be mindful of the slippery boat ramp.

- Race day sponsors were put in place (BBC Plumbing & Gas and Complete Caravan Solutions).
- Task List amended to include requirement for 2-3 people to relocate the Umpire's boat.
 - Procedure currently under development.
- Provision of volunteers throughout the season remained problematic.
- "Naming rights" were initially sought as sponsorship for the State Championships and then withdrawn due to the late notice to prepare in time. To be offered earlier in the new season.
- Paddle for Prostate event scheduled for Sunday 11 April 2021 was cancelled due to extreme weather conditions.
- Agreed to revisit the task allocation for relocation of the Umpire's Boat on race days next season with suggestion put forward could be allocated to one Club throughout the season.
- Chief Official's Report was introduced and agreed to revisit need for this next season or to streamline it further.
- Clubs reminded that RC meeting delegates to attend with information of the races being entered by their club.
- Organising Club to check entries on the Friday night and if there were any significant changes to the team entries to email Clubs seeking their feedback.
- State Championships were held, and all event trophies were upgraded.
- Regional Masters Games event held in Wallaroo on Saturday 17 April with a record number of participants.
- Clubs advised upon Council edict that when setting up tents at Aquatic to not hammer tent pegs in or star dropper poles before 9am to avoid any residential noise complaints.
- Agreed to reintroduce more BCS events.
- Advice given that the Boatshed at Aquatic Reserve will be renovated in 2021/22.
- PDF exemption expires on 30 June 2021.
 - DBSA to seek renewed exemption
- Agreed to hold presentations immediately after the last race to encourage more Club attendance.
- Agreed the trial of composite team racing should continue next season.
- Noted boats would be rotated through the different venues to extend their use.
- Council constructed a pedestrian path at Aquatic Reserve from Bower Road joining the path near where the caravan is parked and a set of steps leading down to the shore.



Appreciation is extended to RC delegates, Clubs and various race day volunteers for their inordinate contributions, willingness and commitment in seeing the race season being as successful as it can.

VOLUNTEERS & OFFICIALS PORTFOLIO REPORT

It has been my pleasure to be the Volunteer & Officials Co-Ordinator for the past 12 months.

There have been some changes that have taken place at the National Level where all Officials are now accredited under the one system.

There are 3 levels which are based on the individual official's knowledge and experience.

The top level is AusDBF Level 3 and SA currently has 5 of them.

Those 5 Level 3 officials are Jennifer Bould, Julie Clinch, Steve Clinch, John Holland and Christine Wood who are also Level 1 IDBF Officials. Previously they have been allocated the main task of Chief Official on a rotating basis however DBSA now insists that the Chief Official must forego racing to officiate.

In August 2020, the following undertook the AusDBF Level 1 Officials course and all passed with flying colours:

- Peter Button, Mick Cahill, Scott Clinch, Maria Darby, Pat Doogue [going for Level 2], Sandy Douglas, Joy Fisher, Christine Graham, Trish Hartwright, Steve Holt, Ronnie Lane, Julie Lister, Ron Ottaway, Kat Reid, Tim White and Glyn Wingard.



All have undertaken roles on race days which helps the day run smoothly and also assists them in gaining knowledge and moves them further up the through the Officials levels.

I am always asked is there are differences between Volunteers and Officials? Well, the answer is Yes.

The easiest way to explain the difference is that Official roles relate directly to racing and Volunteer roles relate to roles where the person does not need to know, and/or understand the Rules of Racing.

Jennifer Bould and I have been endorsed by DBSA to be the members of SA ROMP [Race Officials Mentor Program].

I have been and will continue to mentor each and every up and coming Official.

As part of the 2021 DBSA Awards Night there was a major focus on our Volunteers and Officials without whom the Association would not be able to run as efficiently as it does. DBSA also rewarded our Sponsors with Certificates of Appreciation.

Various levels of achievement were recognised from new volunteers with a Certificate of Appreciation, new AusDBF Officials being rewarded with their caps and a Certificate of Appreciation while some volunteers received their DBSA 5 year service pins along with Certificate of Appreciation for years of service and a copy of the AusDBF Fierce Fast Furious history book.

The last group recognised was for volunteers and officials who have given more than 5 years' service to DBSA and were rewarded with their 5 year pins and their certificates. Those who are now AusDBF Officials were also presented with their caps.

Season 2020/21 saw a reduced volume of work undertaken by members of our paddling community due to public restrictions. A brief summary is listed below:

- Ongoing maintenance to finish line caravan
- Extensive repairs to training craft
- Ongoing repairs to trolleys
- Fibreglass repairs to heads and tails
- Repairs to drummer seat anchor points
- General maintenance to storage facilities at Aquatic and Port Adelaide
- Servicing of all mobile fleet
- In service inspection and testing carried out on electrical equipment for caravan
- LED information sign mounted on rafter in boat shed

As reported last season, much of this work is carried out behind the scenes and often occurs without public recognition. This is the appropriate platform to acknowledge these efforts and thank them for their contributions.



Special thanks

There have been significant contributions by individuals which really do require recognition.

- **Peter Lister**
Peter has been extremely busy with extensive repairs to our training craft. These training craft are extremely important to our high-performance development and for other members wishing to pursue additional personal training.

In addition to this he has been assisting Valerian with repairs to heads and tails.

- **Valerian Kuznetsov**
Valerian has also been extremely generous with his time, carrying out numerous repairs to damaged heads and tails.
- **John Holland**
Always working behind the scenes, John has carried out or organised many small tasks, which not completed can have significant impact on our sport.

Although I have singled out these individuals, the assistance I have received from the Association this season has been great.

Reminder

Just a reminder to Clubs that their maintenance representative is the first point of call for any repairs.

Please make the reimbursement policy available to them as there are specific provisions for maintenance included in it.

Looking forward

From August we will be conducting extensive repairs to our fleet in readiness for the AusChamps next season:

- Boat seats need to be removed, sanded back and lacquered.
- Drummers' seats need to be inspected and any with the single seat support will
- Require additional supports cut, installed and painted.
- All Sweep oars will need to be inspected and repaired as required.

It will be a big off-season and I am looking forward to assisting Clubs with these repairs.

As we commence the new season, it is important for Clubs to inform DBSA of their maintenance representative.

I will be contacting them in the near future.

We will be looking to appoint a Head of Maintenance from our Maintenance representatives to coordinate tasks and provide cost estimates for repairs. Below is a sample of the requirements which will be beneficial to this role.

- Knowledge or interest in scheduling
- Knowledge or interesting in providing estimates
- Good communications
- Self motivated
- ... and of course time.

Volunteers are the lifeblood in any grass-roots sport. Without these remarkable individuals, the sport cannot grow. I am eternally grateful for the time members of our Association give, not only in maintenance, but all areas of our sport. I have drawn on their depth of knowledge and skill set and am grateful for their contribution.

Again, I wish to thank and commend to the Association the Maintenance team of 2020/21.

I would like to thank John Holland for his many years of commitment to the sweeps in our sport and that continues with his membership to the AusDBF sweep committee. John will now concentrate on the leadership of AusDBF.

Ronnie Lane left the panel early in the season before I joined, I'd like to see her back! More recently, Jan Bice has resigned to concentrate on her club commitments but is committed to finishing a couple of things she has started with the panel, and we thank Jan for her excellent service to the Sweep's Committee. Dave Gillies, who was our Regional Examiner has moved to the big smoke, so he too has moved off the panel. Many thanks to Dave. Discussions continue as to how we will cover this loss.

It was discussed that AusDBF would take over the national sweep data base in consultation with state members and state sweep coordinators. Jan started and completed the big job of reconciling RevSport sweep list with reality by contacting each club and not resting until she got a completed list. This list was then sent to AusDBF for their upload to the national system.

We had scheduled three training courses for members to attend:

- 26th September 2020, 6th December 2020, 1st May 2021 – held in Adelaide.
- And 5th June, a well-attended course held in Wallaroo.



The highlight of the Wallaroo course was the assistance throughout the course and presentation of the Drummer portion by Mick Cahill, thanks Mick.

COVID19 restrictions and social distancing have been high in our priorities when running courses. Early on, with one course, as we were all from different clubs, it was decided not to get into a boat together, so we did not have a practical session. It was thought that teams would take on that role on this occasion.

Chris Kelly has taken on the task to look at all sweep and drummer related references on the DBSA web site are UpToDate.

I have been attending (by Zoom) the national Sweep coordinators' meeting. It is interesting to see where we stand when some states are still discussing if a sweep should wear a life jacket or not. Also discussed are things like the contents of the sweep manual and revising the safety handbook.

It was agreed that the State Sweep Co-ordinators are to now take a proactive approach. They will work with all clubs by encouraging clubs to train up more sweeps to Level 3, so that clubs are better prepared to participate at AusChamps in 2022. Moving forward Sweep Co-ordinators will run training courses for beginners and refresher/skill sessions for accredited sweeps from the beginning of next season. This will be our focus going into the new season.

JUNIOR DEVELOPMENT REPORT

As with everything else, the Covid19 shutdown had a major impact on the progress of Junior Dragon Boat development in South Australia.

When we returned to paddling, a number of juniors decided that for various reasons, they would not be returning to our sport and others reduced their involvement. At the end of last year, we had 12 juniors and of those, five re-joined, six left the sport and one had an 18th birthday. Two of those who left the sport are quite likely to return in 2021-22.

We had to basically start a rebuild and we now look likely to sign up ten new juniors for 2021-22. Their signed registration forms will be submitted to DBSA before the start of the racing season. At the time of writing, we also have another nine juniors booked in for introductory sessions – these juniors have come from contact lists from School Holiday programs.

The aim is to be able to enter a junior standard boat crew in AusChamps in Adelaide in 2022.

We continued to work with schools to promote Dragon Boating but in most cases, we do not get the take up we want as most participants are already engaged with their chosen sports, and we find that we are competing with the mainstream sports of Soccer, Netball, Basketball, Australian Rules Football and Cricket. We get the greatest success with primary school aged children who have not yet chosen a sport and enjoy the competition but do not have to stand out from the group as there is greater pressure to perform individually in other mainstream sports.

Port Adelaide Enfield council are now organising school holiday programs and we registered dragon boating last year but did not get enough respondents for the day, but we did run a session for those interested on a Saturday morning. We will register again in 2021 and will hopefully have more success.



One of our longest serving Juniors (competed in our junior crew in 2016) has just graduated from juniors and has completed the level 1 Coaching Course and will be assisting with our youngsters. Cassidy has represented Australia in the Auroras and has packed a lot of experience into his seven years in our sport.

There are a few junior members in other DBSA clubs but for some reason they are not interested in participating in the DBSA junior program. Hopefully, with AusChamps being held in Adelaide in 2022 there may be some more interest and encouragement to build a strong junior contingent for our home Championships

We all need to keep up the efforts to recruit juniors and it would be great to get more youngsters providing competition at our regattas.

SA REGIONAL MASTERS GAMES – COPPER COAST

The Copper Coast Masters Games Dragon Boat event formed part of the largest SA Regional Masters Games ever held in South Australia. The total event attracted over 1,600 registrations. Dragon Boating had 286 registrations (15 teams) plus 26 officials and volunteers.

The event was hosted at Wallaroo, with the Wallaroo Marina basin providing the zoned racing area and the land-based part of the event was held on Inverness Way.



With participants, officials and volunteers, corporate challenge participants, plus supporters, members of the public and stall holders the event hosted more than 500 people on the day. While most teams were from SA, Mildura Dragons from Victoria formed the biggest group they have ever taken away bringing 22 registered participants. Individual registrations also came from Kangaroo Island, Cowell and Tasmania. Another highlight of the event was the registration of a Future Masters Team, Studio Venno.

We started promoting the games on 30th October 2020. Registrations opened in early December. Cancellation of the AusChamps in Perth, which had clashed with the Regional Masters Games dates, provided the opportunity for Adelaide teams to participate too. As an addendum to this year's date clash with the AusChamps, further discussion has been held with SA Sport to avoid this going forward however next year's dates, which have already been set and also clash, are unable to be changed.

With a record number of entries and the enthusiasm of teams to enter every race possible and after consultation with Team Managers, it was agreed most races would run 2 rounds instead of 3 to fit the program into the day. The program ran with 36 races, 12 minutes apart. We nearly made it through all of them, however with the aquatic licence times and daylight working against us just a few races were cancelled at the end of the day.



Some frustrations with registration melted once the anticipation of the games moved in. Thanks to all, including the Copper Coast District Council, as the spirit of cooperation and goodwill was abundant with everyone culminating in a successful day for all involved.

The working Committee included John Holland and Vi Duong. Further support was provided by DBSA. Copper Coast Battle Dragons were the host team, assisting with logistics. Officials and Volunteers were outstanding with many phoning or emailing to offer their assistance and others very generously helping with their specialised skills.

A very sincere thanks to this entire group. The event would not be possible without these exceptional people.



I hope the taste of participating in the SA Regional Masters Games on the Copper Coast has ignited a flame for the future and all clubs include participation of their teams in their annual planning going forward.

THE SAILING CLUB

The Sailing Club is a joint venture between DragonBoatSA (DBSA) & Port Adelaide Artists Forum (PAAF) that started back in 2011.

Over the last twelve months The management committee consisting of selected members from DBSA and PAAF meet on a regular basis.

Any major or unusual expenditure is considered by the Committee and final approval given by both partners. A co-contribution of \$500 each was provided in July 2020 to cover the installation of a replacement air-conditioner for The Sailing Club. A capital contribution by both partners was required in October 2020 due to the ramifications of Covid-19 to covers regular expenses incurred by The Sailing Club as there was no income.

The DBSA Treasurer keeps a record of all receipts and payments and any other financial transactions for The Sailing Club. Hire invoices and expense claims are forwarded to the Treasurer from the Management Committee. Regular financial reports are submitted:

- Income: \$7770.00 – 50.8% increase on the previous year = reopening post Covid
- Expenses: \$7920.14 – 11.4% increase on the previous year
- Operating loss: -\$ 150.14

The Sailing Club has four dragon boats stored onsite and serves as an alternate venue to the Aquatic boat shed for Clubs to use for dragon boat training at the Port

The hire of facility either the Gallery Yampu or the meeting room are arranged through the online SmartSpace booking system continued. All users comply with the Covid19 safe management plan and QR code check-in authorised through state government regulations. Since July 2020 there have been 28 bookings by the registered people/groups aside from DBSA and PAAF. Several users book the facility repeatedly

The original aim of the joint venture in 2011 was to have the facility running at break-even after expenses from the income generated. The financial position of The Sailing Club continues to be supported by both partners while showing a deficit.



The Sailing Club future is unknown at this stage due to the housing development next door at Fletcher's Slip. We await the state government action.

FINANCE REPORT

The report is presented for the final time by the long-standing Board member/Treasurer.

Jennifer Bould began as the first Treasurer when the Association was formed, then resumed in the role again in 1996 up to today.

Starting with handwritten financial ledgers, it progressed to a computer based MYOB system. The Association has grown in membership numbers and assets from the beginning while travelling down the financial road with trials and tribulations along the way to flourish as an Association.

Revenue is generated by three main streams:

- Membership – through registration fees (down 4.5%) and race fees (up 31%)
- Grants – up 4.3% due to local government Covid-19 grant.
- Marketing – through corporate events (up 137%) and sponsorship (up 100%)

Expenses - Administration costs accounted for 61.6% of income this season

This financial year:

Income	\$178,732.04 up by 14.5% on the previous year
Expenses	\$164,390.46 up by 8% on the previous year
Operating profit	\$ 14,341.59

As with any Association financials there is a balance between income vs expenses while providing services to the Association membership and growing dragon boating in SA.

Everyone has a part to play in moving the Association forward with a positive outlook and a comfortable sound financial base through growing our numbers and marketing/sponsorship opportunities.

The DBSA Board is planning and organising the next year's budget that will include the income stream from the AusChamps which will be held in Adelaide in April 2022.

I would like to thank the Board (current and past) for support over the years of me being here and especially Pat Doogue as the MYOB Consultant for DBSA and volunteer BAS agent.

The audited financial report by Terry Caldwor is included.




